Durham NH Historic District & Downtown: Existing Signs

- Gateway at Main Street and Madbury Road
- Downtown shops on Main Street
- UNH along Main Street
- Gateway from the south on Newmarket Road/Route 108
- Other gateways with no signage

Main Street Historic District

Combined with bicycle lane sign, small and very high above eye level

Note the change in lamp style from Downtown to Historic District

There is no indication for pedestrians walking from the Madbury Road direction



Main Street Downtown Shops

Note the Downtown pole style combined with seasonal wreath

This is the meeting point of UNH signage and Downtown

UNH banners on every pole provide a bold signature effect



Durham NH Historic District: Concepts for Signs

Main Street Historic District

Note the change in lamp style from Downtown to Historic District

Concept: Triangle at road center island as the location for a larger gateway sign "Entering Durham Historic District" visible to traffic on Main Street and pedestrians on Madbury Road

Concept: Banners on light poles

Concept: individual building signs

Concept: Banners on light poles, could include names of significant buildings

Concept: Interpretive sign for First NH Turnpike, historical change from water-based to land-based transportation and shift in town center location

Concept: banner on light pole

Concept: Interpretive sign with overview of the District, map, QR code, added to Lafayette mini-plaza

Concept: Individual building sign for significant site – for instance Old Brick Town Hall / Courthouse



Durham Point Road & Route 108

Existing: There is no indication of the extent of the District along Durham Point Road

Concept: A large gateway sign "Entering Durham HD" could be installed on Durham Point Road at the HD boundary as traffic heads toward Route 108.

Concept: Major gateway signage could be located on both sides of Route 108 in the Town Pound parcel and the Meadow parcel.



Newmarket Road / Route 108

Existing: HD sign is too small for vehicle-speed viewing and too low

Concept: A large gateway sign "Entering Durham HD" could be installed on Newmarket Road at the first property as traffic heads north, replacing existing sign.

COncept: Banners on utility poles



Dover Road / Route 108

Existing: There is no indication of entering the District for traffic on Dover Road going south toward the Main Street intersection

Concept: A large gateway sign "Entering Durham HD" could be installed on Dover Road as traffic heads south toward Main Street.


