Trees are simply better for humans than asphalt.




The New York Times article "What Technology Could Reduce Heat Deaths? Trees" prompted one reader to comment:

The Board Is Giving Away Options

- It green-lighted a parking plan without further negotiation about reducing the number of parking spaces, taking CDA's word that Hannaford will not budge
 - Waived, on August 25, with no preceding discussion and no citation of the specific site plan section, the "regulation for the maximum number of parking spaces between landscaped median strips or islands."
 - Could have asked CDA to make medians at least 9 feet wide, as in current site plan regulations. (This IS a Conditional Use Permit application!)
- Some members appear to see an equivalence between restoration plans along College Brook within the required 75-foot wetland upland buffer strip and onsite landscaping



- Portsmouth: Market Basket and Shaw's on Woodbury Avenue; another Market Basket on Lafayette Road/Rte 1


