First of all, I feel terribly greedy asking you to respect my property and to realize the violations of conditional use in light of the fact that there are so many helpless humans currently running from the country they love. For this moment though, I will state my case.

These, however, are proposed to be removed and replaced with a heat island which will subsequently increase my home temperature and electric bills. Any new trees planted will not be substantial until long past my days on earth.

The natural beauty of the forested area, which includes so many birds, owls, and deer to name a few, is a lovely sight, especially in a downtown locale. It is both unique and buffering and, if approved, the woods that I maintain on my land in this beautiful Church Hill District will be the last tree canopy set to remain "downtown".

The night is currently still except for the sound of frogs and crickets. This would be in stark contrast with a future of car doors, alarms, snow plows and simple conversation accentuated by the openness so near to my home.

This project is labeled as <u>19-21 Main Street</u> and it has been made clear and even boasted that nothing will be visible from Main Street; however, It will be a backdrop to my entire property. Also, the residents who live on Chesley Dr and in the Faculty neighborhood who enjoy the Chesley foot path take offense that our 24 hour 7 day a week view is less important than the mere 5 seconds it takes to drive past this property on Main Street. This "hidden" project concerns me as to what else will be hidden during and after its construction. Certainly no one will be monitoring the work during its building phase, and once approved it is too late to realize its stark appearance.

Although a proposed 6 foot fence to lessen the impact will be placed near our home *in what* we have considered our backyard. It is still ~2 feet below the site lines from all rear rooms in the house as the interior of the house sits higher than the elevation of the yard. ## Murphy.

Conditional use violations are numerous and I am not going to repeat what can be read by the over 50 citizen comments. I thank you for the exhaustive efforts you put into your positions and plea that you observe and exercise rights granted to the planning board in your deliberations.
