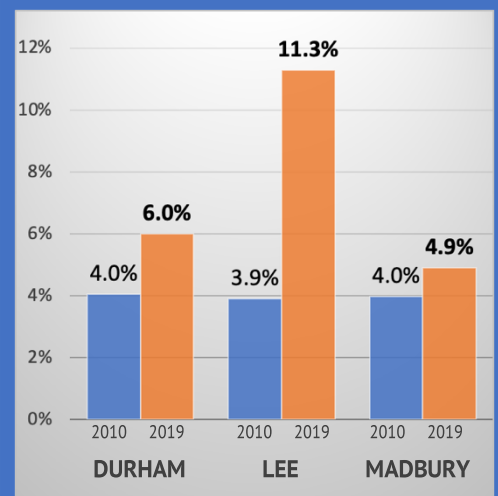
Sharing Experiences of Oyster River Asian Americans.
